#### Message from the B& B



Yes, we are the Society for Creative Anachronisms. Occasionally your Chronicler likes to set the record wrong about a few historical matters. This month's Anachronism is brought to you by:

## The Invention of the Crumborn



This terrifying instrument was first devised by Count Robert le Rossignol of Vin Aigre, whose chateau was plagued by indifferent plumbing. A luckless servant was handed the first prototype and told to blow down the bathroom drain with it after a particularly festive spa party. On hearing the initial fanfare the dirty water fled in confusion. His eldest daughter Philomène retrieved the instrument from the garden shed whence it had been banished; washed and dried it, and composed several dances for it.

Her father pronounced the instrument's unique sound as reminiscent of a bagpiper with hiccups; but his dauntless daughter proceeded to make them in several sizes so she could have a dance consort to adorn her forthcoming wedding to Count Phillipe Mal-de-Mer. Her father was unremitting hostile to her music until an invasion from the neighbouring county of Malchance was successfully repelled by a shatteringly loud bransle in 4/4 time.

Thereafter the crumhorn was here to stay, although Count Robert used his own personal alto instrument mostly to scratch the small of his back. (Also his wife's.) As with recorders, the soprano and tenor are tuned in C, and the alto and bass in F. A great bass crumhorn was successfully employed by Count Robert in a tourney to pitch his opponent out of the saddle with the hook.

The use of crumhorns as weapons of war was discontinued after the discovery of the shawm (imported from the Arab lands), which has been known to sterilise frogs across a ploughed field. The shawm is also more readily scalable, and a full set in consort may cause wax to issue from the ears. A great bass shawm (pictured) should only be attempted with mountaineering equipment, and sounds like a hippopotamus after far too many drinks at the waterhole.
