Dendelyoun Bastian is 15th century а Lancastrian from a family of weavers. Their thought mother Alisoun is to have manufactured the infamous Blackpool Shroud, purported to be the burial robe of St Cuthbert of Bootle. The Shroud enjoyed a short-lived notoriety as a votive object; and when draped over a statue of the Virgin, the latter was observed to weep tears of pure glycerine. Bastian's father was a notorious drunk, but also formidable exponent of а the ancient Lancastrian martial art of Eee-Rheum, which he taught to Bastian, who became the Pennines champion three years running. Eee-Rheum depends on deft wrist movement: combining

speed in defence and slowness in attack, lest the rhubarb stalk should snap off. If this happens the luckless contestant is made to stand on one leg and be pelted with cabbage leaves. Nowadays Eee-Rheum has been largely superseded by aggressive cookery and clog dancing; but the art of striking one's opponent with combat rhubarb is surely worthy of revival.

#### Robert de Brus, Sherriff of Nottingham<sup>3</sup>

The Sheriffs of Nottingham have experienced a dreadful reputation, thanks largely to the many tales of Robin Hood. The impressive castle of Nottingham occupied a strategic position north of the River Trent, keeping an eye on mutinous Yorkshire folk to the North; and the great forest of Nottingham, home of many a merry outlaw who shot not only the King's deer therein,



but also the King's geese, the King's swans, The King's voles, the King's rabbits and the King's celery. In fact they'd shoot just about anything if there was a meal in it. Nottingham used to be known as Snotyingham, or Place Of Nasal Congestion, although some scholars claim that it was once the home of the Snotingas: a particularly fierce band of marauders who also shot anything that moved and much that didn't.

Robert de Brus held the post of Sheriff in the early 15th century. He was a kindly man by the standards of the day, despite being a Southron whose Kentish brogue was much derided. He was sometimes confused with King Robert Bruce – famous for his enormous battle spider with which he smote the English in many a battle – and grew weary of comments to the eUect that his was the weirdest Scots accent anyone had ever heard. At first he would explain that his branch of the family had renounced their Scots estates and decided to

be English instead; and after a year or two he would say No Relation! and leave it at that.

Robert was charged with raising a company of local archers to take part in the quarter-finals of the Hundred Years' War, and held an archery competition on the river-meads to find the best bowmen for selection to Henry V's military adventurism. The first likely lad gave his name as Robyn Hode, and while he managed to hit some of the hay bales, he also shot two mule wagons, the church steeple and an unfortunate pigeon. The second lad was also Robyn Hode, and the third. All told he collected seventeen Robyn Hodes, five Little Johns (ranging in height from five to seven feet), three Will Scathloks and two Friar Tucks, who promptly excommunicated each other.

Feeling unsurprisingly that he was being gently mocked, a subsequent tourney was held the next day, and eventually a band of fifty stout bowmen was formed, with a company of men-at-arms in bright mail from the castle. They performed adequately at the siege of Harfleur and managed not to shoot arrows into each other at Azincourt. All but two made it home safely, with a modest store of booty. These two fell in with obliging French widows and wouldn't hear of any notion of returning home to the northern fogs of Nottingham. Robert was hoping to be awarded the Order of the Garter, but had to be content with the Order of the Golden Spoon, given to the company with the best cooks and caterers. My men may not be the best shots in the army, he reflected, but these forest men can make a good meal out of just about anything.
